RECENT EVENTS

MT VICTORIA'S MARITIME LINKS

In June we were privileged to have Roger Carter of the Maritime Museum talk to us. He explained the functions of the Mt Victoria's maritime signal station - differing flags for different company vessels, for vessel types etc.

He also covered the history of the Clyde Quay and Oriental Bay areas.

A former Royal Navy officer and berthing master with the Wellington Harbour Board, Roger was very knowledgeable speaker. Not only are we all now more familiar with the suburbs maritime links, but we now know more about ship riggings and ship types, to name but a few of the interesting points we learnt during his talk.

MVHS GOES TO THE MOVIES

The August Film Centre visit was a great success. Steve Russell, the Film Archives Visitor Programmes Coordinator, gave an introductory talk about the Film Centre, describing its functions of acquiring and restoring our film heritage, and making these available to the public through exhibitions, film screenings and the library facility.

Alan spent some time at the Film Centre prior to the visit, choosing the films we then viewed. Although there are none specifically on Mt Victoria, each of the films showed something of interest. The films we saw were -*Hapuka Fishing 1925*, featuring fishing at Island Bay, *The Maritime City 1930* and *Around Port Nicholson 1934*, featuring views around the city's hills including a very denuded and bare Mt Victoria, *Bigger and Better Wellington 1936*, showing the old Band Rotunda at Oriental Bay, *Honouring a Venerable Patriarch 1934* showing fleeting glances of Kent and Cambridge Terrace as the procession celebrating Archbishop Redwood's Diamond Jubilee service arrived at the Basin Reserve for an open air mass, and *Crown of the City 1946*, showing the Carillon and views of the houses in Molesworth Street prior to the building of the new cathedral. Finally we saw *Toehold on a Harbour 1966*, featuring a young Kate Harcourt, amongst others commenting on living in Wellington.

Steve then showed us through the Film Centre Reference Library. This facility is open to the public who are welcome to view the films many of which are on video, and to use the books and magazines.

The City Council has just filed another Resource Consent Application to relocate the Queen Victoria Statue back to Post Office Square. You may have seen the Evening Post article on the 11-10-97 or seen Alan on the TV3 News on Sunday 12th.

The Society made an objecting submission in 1996 when the Council last tried this. We believe the statue has far more significance in its current site and should stay where it is. If the Council wants a piece of "Art" for P.O Square it should commission something new such as the Plimmer Statue in Plimmer steps.

Arguments that she is being returned to her original site are ridiculous as the current and planned developments of P.O. Square will make it completely different to what it once was. The Statue will be lost amongst the large trees and extended Clarrie Gibbons building.

The Society will again be making an objecting submission. We want the statue to stay on its current site and be cleaned up, her lean fixed and the area around her tied up.
